In fact, at one time it was the largest city in the Washington Territory.

You'll find the Walla Walla valley nestled in the southeastern corner of Washington state, at the foot of the Blue Mountains and within easy reach of the Snake and Columbia rivers—all with abundant outdoor recreational opportunities. It's beautiful here, and rush hour lasts all of 15 minutes.

Centrally located in the growing Pacific Northwest, we're easily accessible to the West Coast and the Pacific Rim. Transportation and infrastructure options are plentiful, and include truck, access to the BNSF and UP rail lines, river barges, a new regional airport terminal building with commercial air service and the latest fiber optics.
